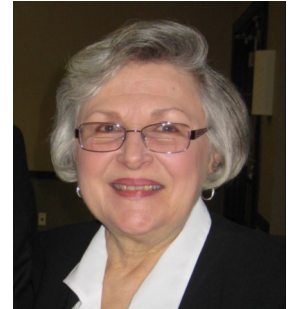

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Excitement is building! The Oklahoma Library Association (OLA) Spring Conference, April 3-5, and FOLIO's Annual Meeting on April 5, are right around the corner. Both are being held at the Ardmore Convention Center.

DID YOU KNOW????? FOLIO has awarded a total of forty-four **Seed Grants** to Friends of Library groups since 1999 as a result of a generous matching grant from the Charles and Lynn Schusterman Family Foundation of Tulsa. Twelve Seed Grants were awarded from 1993-1998 making a total of 56 Friends groups who have received financial assistance from FOLIO.



Okie Poet to be Honored in Stroud

Stroud will be the next site for an Oklahoma Literary Landmark. The late poet Wilma Elizabeth McDaniel (1918-2007) will be honored Sunday, April 28 during National Poetry Month. The dedication will be held at 2:30 p.m. at Stroud Public Schools, C. B. Wright Auditorium.



Wilma McDaniel was born near Stroud to Benjamin and Anna McDaniel. Her father was a sharecropper and her mother was a homemaker. Wilma attended schools in Lincoln and Creek counties until the effects of the Great Depression and Dust Bowl led her family to migrate to California in 1936. She

became known as the "Okie Poet" in the Central Valley of California. Over fifty chapbooks of her poetry have been published and her writing is frequently included in anthologies of literature of working-class people. Her Oklahoma roots remained strong and she has many poems about her early life in Oklahoma and her love for her home state.

The Stroud Public Library is co-sponsoring the Literary Landmark Dedication and will be the site for the bronze plaque. Partners to date include Oklahoma State University Library, Back40 Publishing, Friends of Oklahoma Center for the Book, Village Books Press, and Tom and Leslie Hubbell.

Literary Landmarks is a national program which was founded in 1986 by former Friends of Libraries U.S.A. president Frederick G. Ruffner to encourage the dedication of historic literary sites. Sites honor a deceased literary figure, author, or his or her work. To date, more than 120 Literary Landmarks have been dedicated across the country.

Oklahoma has ten Literary Landmark sites: Woody Guthrie, Okemah; Ralph Ellison Library, Oklahoma City; Lynn Riggs, Claremore Public Library; Angie Debo, Marshall City Hall and OSU Library, Stillwater; John Berryman, McAlester Public Library; Sequoyah's Cabin, near Sallisaw; Will Rogers Memorial Museum, Claremore; John Joseph Mathews, Osage Tribal Museum, Pawhuska; and Woodrow Wilson Rawls, Tahlequah Public Library.

Plan now to attend the celebration in Stroud on Sunday, April 28 at 2:30 p.m. honoring Wilma Elizabeth McDaniel, the Okie Poet.

United for Libraries Awards

Giving public recognition to an individual, family or corporate body that has made a major gift to your library will generate publicity that can encourage others gifts as well.

United for Libraries' Major Benefactor Citation comes with a plaque for the library and a plaque for the donor. These plaques, along with a library celebration and a press release from your library, can let your community know that gifts to the library are truly appreciated and make a real difference.

Major Benefactor Citation recipients are featured on the United for Libraries website, and a press release about each recipient is issued through ALA.

Applicants are asked to include documentation describing the nature of the library's relationship with the benefactor, why the gift is considered major, and any publicity generated as a result of the gift.

Friends in Poteau Raise Funds to Furnish New Building

Exciting and wonderful things are happening for library supporters in Poteau. And the Friends have been right in the thick of things. A new library building, triple the size of the current one will open in May 2013, replacing the Buckley Library which moved to its current location in 1969. Funds for the new building came from the City of Poteau through various donations to the city. One of the largest contributors was the Lynch family and the building will be known as the Patrick Lynch Public Library. Patrick Lynch was a beloved second grade teacher in Poteau who died tragically in a car accident in October 2006.

The Friends of Buckley Library were asked to raise the funds for the furnishings and equipment inside the library. Through various fundraisers and generous donations they have raised \$350,000 to date. The largest annual fundraiser—La Fiesta—will be held in September. This event raised around \$13,000 last fall.



The Friends held the Inaugural St. Paddy's Day 5K & Little Leprechaun Dash on March 9. This event was a huge success with 150 registered runners/walkers. Each finisher received a custom medal featuring a rendering of the new library. The Tulsa Life Flight crew brought their helicopter for participants and spectators to tour. This event will definitely be an annual event for the group. They are already planning to add a 10K to increase profits. About \$1200 was raised.



The recent 2nd Annual Chocolate Decadence party featured delicious delights from local culinary artists and raised approximately \$900. After each dessert was judged, the public spent the evening sampling these decadent desserts. Yummm!

Friends President Glenda Wise says, "We feel that we have three good fundraisers that appeal to all types of people and give everyone the opportunity to take ownership in the library. The Friends have been able to help choose furnishings and equipment for the new library. We can't wait to unveil the selections to the public in May."

FOLIO's Endowment Fund— Growing with the Times

Why does FOLIO need an endowment fund? What does FOLIO do with an endowment fund? How does it grow?

In 2008, the FOLIO Board voted to establish an Endowment Fund with Oklahoma City Community Foundation (OCCF). The purpose was to provide a stable financial base for the future and to provide funds to make scholarship monies available for support staff in Oklahoma libraries. We started by raising \$12,000 from Friends and friends, libraries, clubs, and citizens. We have received matching funds from the Kirkpatrick Family Fund and OCCF. The funds have been invested and our fund is now valued at more than \$55,000.

Since 2009, the scholarship awards have increased from \$250 to \$500. The goal is to keep increasing the amount of the scholarships—and to keep growing better qualified librarians for the state of Oklahoma.

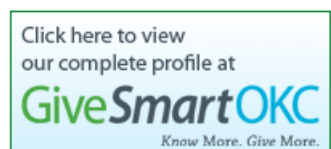


Kirkpatrick has agreed to another matching grant for FOLIO in 2013. The challenge is for FOLIO to raise \$6000. Kirkpatrick will then match it with \$2000, resulting in more growth for the endowment. We're off to a good start with \$1500 raised at this point.

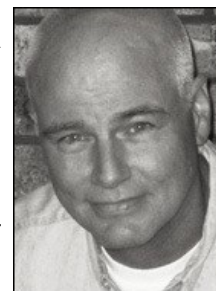

Rose State College FOL Re-Organizes

Last fall, Rose State College Library reorganized their Friends of the Library@RSC. The few previous charter members kicked off a membership drive in October with a social get-together. Carl Sennhenn, Oklahoma Poet Laureate 2001-02 and RSC adjunct professor, entertained the guests with readings of his own poetry.

In February FOL@RSC co-sponsored a book sale with the student Library Club, so both groups were able to benefit from the profits. Several members toured the Oklahoma City National Memorial Archives with the student club. The Archives collects, labels, and stores items related to the tragedy.

Tim Tharp, RSC professor, will speak at an April program. Tim won the 2007 YA Oklahoma Book Award for his novel, *Knights of the Hill Country*. Another recent novel, *The Spectacular Now*, has been made into a motion picture and previewed at the 2013 Sundance Film Festival. He will be speaking about writing and his experiences at the Sundance Festival.



FOL@RSC grew from 5 members to 17 in just a few short months. We are thrilled to have our own Rose State writers and poets join us and help promote the organization. In upcoming meetings and discussions, members will set goals to help with needs of the library. The organization promises to be active and visible on the college campus.

Books You Love

A Favorite Program of the Friends of Will Rogers Library

The Friends of Will Rogers Library in Claremore recently enjoyed one of the most successful and well received programs we've ever hosted. The program, "Books You Love," featured five well-known community personalities talking to our audience about books they'd found to be especially meaningful, memorable or impactful. Our guests included Claremore's mayor; a local attorney and former state senator; the director of our area CASA program; a superintendent of schools in northeast Oklahoma; and the wife of Rogers State University's president, whom we like to call the First Lady of RSU.

The idea for this program was sparked when a member of our group brought to the attention of the program committee an out-of-state newspaper featuring photographs of local citizens of all ages holding favorite books. I remembered that years ago, as a high school librarian, I had planned a large window display for Valentine's Day called Books You Love. Red and pink hearts had enclosed photos of assorted students and teachers with the titles of books that were special to them. The enthusiasm and curiosity generated by that display had surprised me. I learned then that, just as we're curious to know what movies and music are most popular, we have a natural interest in what others are reading. With those thoughts in mind, our program committee started planning a "Books You Love" event for our public library.



We began by generating a list of potential presenters. We sought people who were well known in our community, who were committed to the importance of reading, and who would be comfortable speaking to a group. After choosing five good candidates, members of our committee contacted the individuals personally. We asked that each presenter choose a book from any time in his or her life that was especially important or meaningful. We did not use the phrase, "favorite book," because so many people love multiple books and feel that a favorite is impossible to choose. We didn't require that the presenters reveal their choices in advance and it was especially fun on the evening of the program to learn what their chosen titles were! Each presenter was told he or she would have five to ten minutes to reveal or present the book in any way he or she desired and to entertain a few questions or comments from the audience when the presentation was concluded. Our guest speakers were naturals talking about books, and our membership and audience raved about what a fun evening it

was. We could not have been more pleased with the results!

What really made this program such a success was not what we did, but what was offered by our five Claremore luminaries who thought seriously about the books they chose and spoke sincerely and candidly about what was significant to them from the books. Our mayor, a former police chief, talked about the novels and nonfiction of Joseph Wambaugh, telling us he felt an identity with the policeman/author, although the problems of Los Angeles cops in the novels seem somewhat different from the municipal concerns of Claremore. Our CASA director, who has a passion for the children for whom she works, told of reading [A Tree Grows in Brooklyn](#) as a young girl from a hardworking family and learning lessons and sensitivities that she would carry forward in her life. Our former school superintendent and our former state senator chose biographies of presidents and discussed how the examples of Lincoln and LBJ had influenced their leadership styles. Finally RSU's First Lady, who is herself a successful figure in the realm of finance, selected the autobiography of Katharine Graham and revealed that she read it with a growing awareness of how difficult it had once been for women to overcome their insecurities and step into a position of influence in a male dominated world. I think what we all loved was that each presenter was willing to speak from the heart and share a little of his or her inner self with us.



This was not a difficult program to coordinate. Our hospitality committee stepped up to the plate and enlisted a little extra help in providing refreshments for a larger than usual audience. A simple program, listing the presenters in their order of appearance was handed out at the door. Since none of the presenters chose to use any equipment, no special set up was required. We arranged the chairs and set up the podium, and we were ready to go. As is our custom, we gave a small gift of appreciation to each presenter.



We've had many requests to repeat this program and even to make it an annual event. We're contemplating our roster of presenters for next year!

Attached to front of the base is a 4 inch brass plaque with the words engraved in front of the base.
