Libraries: Buildings and Renovations with Friends

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At the OLA Conference on May 1, 2015, FOLIO sponsored a program highlighting two recent building and renovation projects in which Library Friends played a key role.

Nancy B. Hamlin, Head Librarian, Patrick Lynch Public Library in Poteau, shared the story about the new library construction. This library, which opened in 2013, is part of the Southeastern Public Library System. The city of Poteau had received a Reynolds Foundation grant to fund a new community center and was working



with the same architect for expanding the 7,000 square foot Buckley Public Library building. However, to better meet the community's needs, the architect recommended construction of a new library across from the city's new community center. The city hired a professional fundraiser and sold IRS tax credits to help fund the construction of the new library building of 21,060 square feet. The library is named for a beloved teacher who was born and raised in Poteau and who positively impacted many people in his short life. Gerry Roberts, President of the Friends of the Library, spearheaded the library initiative for four years by forming a directors' group of 15 local citizens. She revitalized the Friends into an active, dedicated and determined group which held fundraisers, built relationships within the community, and rallied the community to the cause. Through Gerry's leadership the Friends raised over \$250,000 for all of the furnishings in the new building. The Friends of Patrick Lynch Public Library has a Facebook page.

Carolyn Klepper, Vice President of the Friends of Mustang Library and a past-president of FOLIO, and Desiree Webber, Director of Mustang Public Library, shared how the Mustang Library expanded by 7200 square feet. The library hired a consultant, an experienced library director from a community similar in size to Mustang, to do a study and to help the Library Board produce a 20-year strategic plan for the library. The chair of the Strategic Plan Committee presented the plan to the city council. Six years later, the city council voted to include funding for the library renovation as part of a \$3 million bond issue for the city. The library's expansion, which cost \$1.2 million, focused on the children's and teen areas, but the entire library's interior received a make-over.

Carolyn Klepper was one of three community members on the Library Building Project. She utilized her interior design skills to choose fabrics and colors. The Friends

Friends Co-Sponsor Chautauqua in Lawton

"The Dust Bowl: Strong Winds, Strong Characters" was the Oklahoma Chautauqua theme this year, presented by Oklahoma Chautauqua in association with the Oklahoma Humanities Council. The Friends of the Lawton Library was a local co-sponsor, hosting each event. Workshops were held at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. each day with evening performances at 7 p.m.

Featured were John Steinbeck, Hazel Doris Lucas Shaw, Ernie Pyle, Woody Guthrie and Lena Lowery Sawner. Mrs. Sawner was an African-American woman whose adult life spanned an era from early Indian/Oklahoma Territory Days through the Dust Bowl/Depression era. From 1902 to 1934, Mrs. Sawner served as principal of Douglass High School in the segregated school system of Lincoln County, Chandler, OK. She thought education should be holistic, including the academic and practical. She said that "teachers must be motivated and highly qualified." She transformed the negative energy of segregation and racism into a positive force in the lives of her students and of her beloved Chandler.

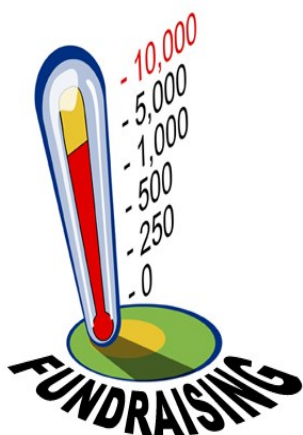

Library Friends Help Fund E-Readers



Friends of the Lawton Public Library raised \$20,000 over the last few years through things such as the International Festival (selling soft drinks) and their book sales, according to Library Director Kristin Herr. They have also received a \$10,000 matching grant from the Laura Fields Trust. The library has purchased e-readers (electronic devices, i.e., iPads and Kindles),

where electronic books may be downloaded and read. Herr said, "People are requesting it on a continual basis. It is the No. 1 request at the library."

Lawton PL joined the Oklahoma Virtual Library consortium centered around Overdrive. "Our customers come into this with books already purchased by the consortium, instead of starting from scratch and building our own library," Herr reported. Users may download their books anywhere that has an Internet connection.

Great Brainstorming on Fundraising

Friends from branches of the Pioneer Library System had a workshop this spring. Participants came up with some great ideas for raising funds.

- At an ongoing book sale highlight a different type of book each month, i.e., cookbooks, romance.
- Have a book sale/bake sale three times per year.
- Conduct a silent auction.
- Have Bean Supper with Masons matching the proceeds.
- Do a mystery dinner theatre.
- Have an author book signing or seminar.
- Have poet laureate for program.
- Conduct mini-golf tournament.
- Collect recipes for a bi-annual cookbook.
- Make it easy for attendees to make additional donations.
- Have a pancake breakfast or spaghetti dinner (Some restaurants offer fundraising.)
- Sponsor local sporting events.
- Conduct open house, gala or holiday social.
- Exhibit local art with an art fair.

Best Friends

Metropolitan Library Friends Honored

The Friends of the Metropolitan Library System of Oklahoma County won the Best Friends Award for Friends serving over 10,000 population at the FOLIO Annual Meeting for their community service during the 2014-2015 year. They received a donation of some 100,000 books, mostly children's books, which they decided to give away to teachers or others involved with children in some capacity. They also had a large donation of music books and sheet music that was passed on to a local Middle and High School, which was very much appreciated and utilized. Each week a volunteer comes to the book sorting site and picks up books to take to the local jail, the City Rescue Mission and five hospitals in OKC.

The Friends donated 36,000 comic books to the Oklahoma Department of Libraries for their Comic Book Day in the Libraries. 200 books were donated to Oklahoma Department of Human Services for their Spring Sibling Event, which brings separated siblings together for a day of fun and activities.

The Friends are proud of their community service over the past year, having touched lives both young and old while delivering reasons to love our library. *(More conference awards will be featured in the next issue.)*

Gerry joined Friends of Buckley Library and served as President 2008-2010, during which time:

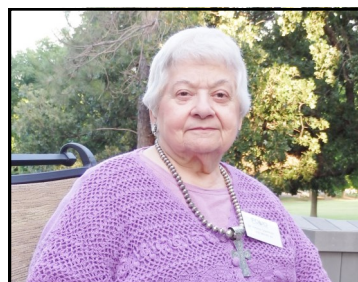
- She initiated changes in the by-laws, expanding the board from 15 to 24 members.

- **National Friends of the Library Week** is Oct. 19-25. This celebration offers a two-fold opportunity to celebrate Friends. Use the time to promote Friends in your community, to raise awareness and to promote membership. This is also an excellent time for your library and Board of Trustees to recognize the contributions of Friends for their help and support of the library. - **Outside the Lines** (Sept. 13-19, 2015) is a global initiative demonstrating the creativity and innovation happening in libraries. Organizations around the world will participate in this weeklong celebration by engaging with their communities in new and exciting ways. (outsidethelines.org)
- **September is Library Card Sign-Up Month** -This is a time to remind parents and children that a library card is the most important school supply of all. Sample press releases, public service announcements, and proclamations are available. Snoopy is the honorary chair this year. (www.ala.org/librarycardsignup) The Tuttle Public Library has an invitation on Facebook for local businesses to be a partner with promotions during the month.
- **Banned Books Week** (Sept. 27-Oct. 3) promotes the freedom to choose or the freedom to express one's opinions and stresses the importance of ensuring the availability of those viewpoints to all who wish to read them. This is a great week for discussion groups and for displays of challenged books. (www.ala.org/bbooks)
- **Teen Tech Week** is Oct. 18-24, encouraging teens to be regular readers and library users. The theme this year is Get Away @ your library to spotlight all the great resources and activities available to help teens build literacy skills while reading for the fun of it. (www.ala.org/teenread)
