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Gwendolyn Hooks to speak at FOLIO Luncheon

Gwendolyn Hooks is the author of 17 books for children. She writes both fiction and nonfiction to encourage children to explore their world. Readers will find pets, friendship, and family sprinkled throughout Gwendolyn's stories because that's what inspires her. Her latest, the eight book Pet Club Series is all about pets: a cat, dog, fish, and a rat. Even her nonfiction books are about animals and a few plants.

She taught math several years, until she realized she wanted to write children's books. Brooks said, "I had stories inside of me before I knew they were there. But once I found them, I couldn't stop until they became published books. I'm still filled with stories. And I write almost every day because I don't want to forget any of them." Brooks advice is to "Never stop reading, writing, or drawing. Whatever your passion, be persistent."

Dr. Judy Neale, FOLIO Board President said, "We are thrilled that Gwendolyn Hooks will speak at the luncheon! She is a dynamic person and speaker. Please join us."

Norman Public Library Central a Literary Landmark

On Sunday, May 3, Norman Public Library Central will be designated a national Literary Landmark in a ceremony that begins at 1:30 p.m. at the library, 225 North Webster Avenue in downtown Norman.

The library will be added to the list of more than 130 sites across the United States that have special literary significance. Norman Central receives its Literary Landmark designation for having on display the 1958 Newbery Award medal.

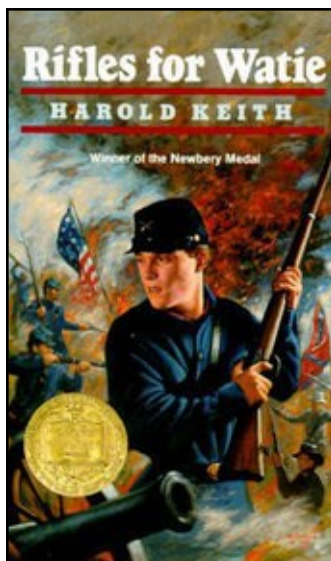
The Newbery has been awarded annually since 1922 for the most distinguished contributions to American literature for children. The Newbery on display in Norman was presented to author Harold Keith for his Civil War novel *Rifles for Watie*. Keith's Newbery medal has been in the children's section of the library since 1993.

Although Keith published more than twenty books for children and adults, he was better known locally for being the first sports information director for the University of Oklahoma. In that role he pioneered the use of a game highlight reel and was a master of the feature story about particular athletes or games. He wrote several sports history books including *47 Straight*, which documented the winning streak of the University of Oklahoma Sooners under coach Bud Wilkinson.

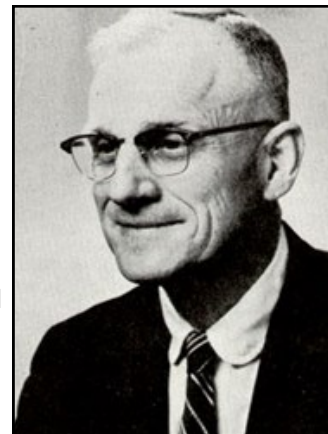
Harold Verne Keith was born April 8, 1903 to Malcom A. and Arlyn Kee Keith in Lambert, Oklahoma Territory. He received both his bachelor's and master's degrees in history from the University of Oklahoma in Norman.

Known as the "Blond Bomb" in his youth, Keith was an avid and life-long runner. With an energy and stamina forged in distance running, Keith worked enthusiastically and tirelessly in parallel careers, writing and sports publicity. He worked for OU from 1931 until he retired in 1968 to become a full-time writer. His son succeeded him in the role of OU sports information director.

Perhaps most endearing was his unflagging sense of humor, usually about himself: "I can run the mile in Monday morning flat," he quipped near the end of his running career. Asked at 90 if he still ran, he said, "To tell the truth, in a run with a pregnant woman, I'd come in third."



Harold Keith died February 24, 1998. He was 94 years old. His last novel, *Chico and Dan* was published posthumously later that year.



The Literary Landmarks project began in 1986. It is an ongoing project of United for Libraries, a division of the American Library Association. With the addition of Norman, the state of Oklahoma has twelve Literary Landmarks located in the communities of Okemah, Oklahoma City, Claremore (2), Marshall, Stillwater, McAlester, Sallisaw, Pawhuska, Tahlequah, and Stroud. Keith joins Oklahoma Literary Landmark authors Woody Guthrie, Ralph Ellison, Lynn Riggs, Angie Debo, John Berryman, Sequoyah, Will Rogers, John Mathews, Wilson Rawls, and Wilma McDaniel.

Guests who attend the May 3 dedication ceremony will enjoy an interactive display that tells the story of Keith's life and dual careers, *Rifles for Watie*, the Newbery Awards, and the Literary Landmarks project.

The popular Byron Berline Band will underscore the event. Berline is the founder of the annual Oklahoma International Bluegrass Festival, and he is widely recognized as one of the world's premier fiddle players. In his days at OU, Berline was befriended by Keith who mentored him in cross country running.

The official Literary Landmark dedication ceremony will begin at 3:00 p.m. Special guests will be members of Keith's family including his niece Lynn McIntosh and his grandson Duke Keith along with his publisher and long-time friend Molly Griffis, who reprinted many of Keith's early works through her Norman publishing house, Levite of Apache.

These books feature our country's founding fathers and give new insights into the history of the revolution. Our audience found Hill's presentation interesting and inspiring. The would-be authors in our group appreciated that she took a few minutes to talk about how to become a successful published author.

The Friends of the Purcell Library host this Celebration every other year, inviting the public to attend, celebrate with them and consider joining the group. The event is provided at no cost to the community and features sandwiches, salads, and a simple dessert.

"We have a strong following," said Vernon. "Before Christmas, we introduced holiday foods at one of our programs and everyone shared recipes." It's just one of the perks Vernon receives as the class instructor!

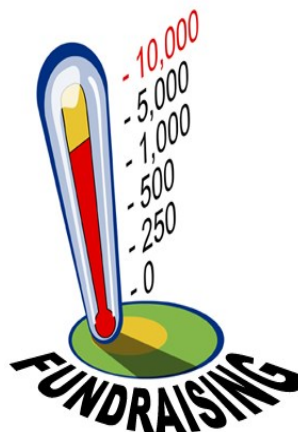
Author and Staff Events at Chickasha PL

FOLIO Is Reaching Out

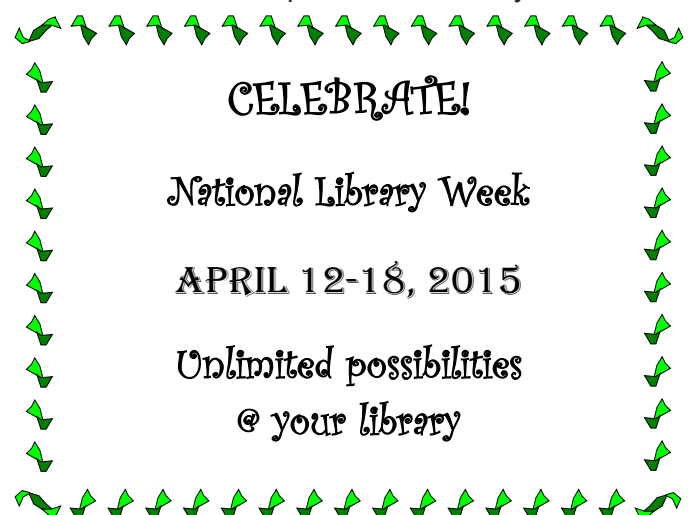

Applications are being accepted for the 2015 scholarship.

She is pursuing her Master of Library and Information Studies (MLIS) degree at the University of Oklahoma with a projected graduation in 2015. Why Public Libraries Are SO Important

In the *FY2014 Annual Report* of Oklahoma Public Libraries the Oklahoma Department of Libraries reports these wonderful statistics that all Friends should become familiar with and share with their elected officials.

- Libraries are technology centers. (100% of Oklahoma's public libraries offer free Internet access and free Wi-Fi. 3,067 public access computers are available in public libraries. 4.17 million Internet sessions were conducted by library users.)
- Libraries have e-books while traditional materials use remains strong. (6.3 million e-books were loaned by public libraries. 22.2 million physical items were borrowed.)
- Libraries are busy. *Really busy!* (2.1 million Oklahomans have library cards. 14.16 million visits to Oklahoma's public libraries. 837,453 children and youth attended 25,060 library programs. 324,075 adults attended 14,006 adult programs.)
