Alton Carter is a former foster child and police officer. He was the first person in his family to graduate from high school and college. Now the director of youth ministries for the First United Methodist Church of Stillwater, OK, the Oklahoma State University alum has dedicated his life to working with young people. In April 2015, his debut book, *The Boy Who Carried Bricks*, was published. The next year, the nonfiction title won the 2016 Oklahoma Book Award. The book is a true recount of Carter's hard-scrabble life growing up on the plains and in the small towns of Oklahoma. He followed with *Aging Out*, how he faced his past and took the steps to live the life he always dreamed about. Carter has also authored two children's books, *The Boy Who Dreams Big* and *The Boy Who Dreamed Big*, and *The Boy Who Went to the Library*. Carter makes his home in central Oklahoma, with his wife, Kristin, and their five children.

Great programs on Thursday include: "Better Volunteers, Better Life," "Long Range Planning," "Moving Forward Together: Advocacy," "Strong Together" (ALA President), "Serving Users with Autism Spectrum Disorder," "Joining Forces to Make a Difference in the Community," "Give and Take Mentorship," and many others.

Preconferences are planned for Wednesday, March 13. "Optimizing Leadership Decision-Making," a full-day workshop, will be engaging and thought-provoking. Attendees will come away with a better appreciation for the role of fast and slow thinking in decision making, feeling empowered to analyze, discuss, debate, and give feedback to better the library. "Advocacy Bootcamp," a half-day workshop, urges attendees to re-think advocacy: to re-define the library community and expand the way we have been advocating for libraries.

Oklahoma Department of Libraries Director Susan McVey Resigned February 1

Susan McVey retired from the **Oklahoma Department of Libraries** on February 1, after 17 years as State Librarian and State Archivist.

Under McVey's leadership, the agency has used federal library funds to provide extensive online reference and information resources to all libraries and schools, and to improve information technology infrastructure in public libraries. Oklahoma was one of the first states to report that all public libraries offered wireless internet access for their communities.

McVey has been committed to helping all public libraries benefit from the federal E-Rate and Oklahoma Universal Services Fund so that they can continue to obtain the technology services that benefit their communities.

Melody Kellogg, new director of the Oklahoma Department of Libraries (ODL), brings with her a three-decade long portfolio of public service in libraries, state government, local government, and the non-profit sector. She was hired by the ODL Board in December to succeed Susan McVey, who retired January 31 after 17 years as director. As the agency's chief officer, Kellogg will work with ODL staff and Oklahoma's library community to continue to build and improve library and information services for all Oklahomans.

ODL Board Chair Phil Moss said Kellogg's extensive experience in a variety of public service settings was instrumental in setting her apart during the interviewing process. "Melody brings a unique combination of backgrounds and skills to ODL," Moss said. "I think her work as a public servant at both the state and municipal levels will benefit the agency, and her various experiences in libraries are also noteworthy. Plus, she has a passion for libraries and the important services they provide to the state and its communities."

Kellogg's public service path began in 1985 when she began a 13-year tenure with the Main Street Program at the Oklahoma Department of Commerce. She was promoted to assistant director in 1988 and later led the program as its director. In 1999 she joined the City of Guthrie as special projects coordinator, kicking off a decade of local government experience. In 2002, the Guthrie City Manager asked Kellogg to be-

come director of the Guthrie Public Library. "I went into that position with the understanding that I would concurrently attain a master's degree in Library and Information Sciences," Kellogg said. "It was a challenge I was eager to take." She completed her degree through the University of Oklahoma in 2004 and served three more years at the library before becoming City Manager of Guthrie, directing a city workforce of 115, and developing and administering the municipality's \$18 million budget.

After a two-year stay at a non-profit church ministry where she served as assistant to the organization's director, she returned to libraries in 2011 when she was hired to manage the Edmond Branch Library for Oklahoma County's Metropolitan Library System. By 2015 she was serving as a Regional Director for Metropolitan, supervising three of the system's library branches. A year later other departments were added to her responsibilities, including a new call center and the team responsible for system-wide programming.

"Melody was always being tapped for leadership positions within her organizations," Moss said. "That speaks volumes."

Kellogg's leadership abilities have also been recognized and rewarded by her library colleagues in the state. She was elected president of the Oklahoma Library Association for 2016-2017 and represented the association and Oklahoma's libraries on the national level.

"My plan is to continue to expand upon the progress and service that has been established under Susan McVey," Kellogg said of her new role as State Librarian. "ODL has made great progress toward connectivity in our rural libraries, and the agency has led the way in the digitization of Oklahoma's state government records. I embrace those accomplishments as we look for new opportunities."

Meeting on Friday, March 15 during the Oklahoma Library Association Conference at the Embassy Suites Hotel in Norman.

FOLIO Increases Support Staff Scholarships

FOLIO has announced an increase to \$600 per award for the Support Staff Scholarships to library staff members wishing to further their education. **The deadline for application is Friday, March 1, 2019.** The scholarships may be awarded to up to four applicants.

Library Friends Are Advocates

What a great time to be a library advocate and Friend! Each of us can make a difference and have an impact in our local community policies, state laws and federal legislation.

This spring our main emphasis is on the state level, asking to restore some of the Oklahoma Department of Libraries' budget which has been drastically cut since the State Fiscal Year 2010. All of the increase will count towards the federal Maintenance of Effort and result in ODL receiving additional federal funds as well.

This may directly and positively impact funds available to your local public library. Your assistance can help.

State Funding is requested to restore the state aid grant funding to public libraries.

Literacy Funding is requested which will restore ODL's grants to literacy providers.

Staff Person Working with Public Libraries - A Librarian III in the Office of Library Development will work directly with assigned municipal libraries and will serve as a lead officer on targeted federal grants.

Library Materials Budget increase to meet ODL's statutory mandates to serve as a library for state government and to support public libraries with interlibrary loans to serve customers.

The proposed legislation of interest will fluctuate. Bills currently being monitored include:

- Public Libraries Advancement Act, shell bills
- Proposed property tax exemptions
- Guidelines on meeting room space
- Social networking and social media policy
- Oklahoma Sooner Choice Trust Act, requiring 3% employee contribution

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Librarians and Friends will visit the State Capitol weekly during the legislative session (except spring break) and the week of OLA Conference

Kristin Herr, Co-Chair of the Oklahoma Library Association Legislative Committee gives these suggestions.

"Want to participate? It is as easy as picking a day and going! Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays are generally good days to visit. We have 'transform' cards to distribute. The latest updates will be available, and I will let you know if anyone else is planning on going that week and loop you in with our library liaisons. That way you can get any last minute updates as you visit." Want a buddy to go with you? Just let Kristin Herr know, and she will try to coordinate a partner. Friends of the Donald W. Reynolds Community Center and Library Serve Those in Need in Durant

Friends of the Donald W. Reynolds Community Center and Library in Durant rallied during 2018 to support our innovative and progressive director, Robbee Tonubbee, in offering at least a minimum of services to the homeless population. Like many towns in Oklahoma that have grown faster than their infrastructure can support, Durant now has growing pains that include completely inadequate provisions for people in transit between jobs, with jobs that don't pay enough to cover rent, or are between places to shelter.

The Friends began contributing free coats and food to place on a help-yourself counter in the Library's Bookista Café. Further, the Friends have written editorials and opinion pieces published in the local newspaper that reinforce Director Tonubbee's philosophy that the Community Center aspect of our mission includes the whole community. Of course, our efforts fall far short of providing a homeless shelter and counseling, but we feel we are paving the way for a kinder, more productive way of dealing with this particular growth problem.

One of our speaking points to promote this project is to ask the question; "Have you ever been just two or three paychecks away from losing your home?" We also tell people that we do not see the difference between providing services for the homeless and running a very successful program to help veterans claim benefits, to help seniors and others file tax returns, to offer a free lunch to children in our summer reading program, to offer after-school supervised play to "latch-key" children, to offer tutoring services for non-English speakers, and any of other services provided.

If your library or community center experiences homeless-related challenges, the Friends can help!
